Tirm But Fair

Our Student Code of Conduct has been developed in collaboration with students, parents, staff and regional experts in the field of behaviour management. Through an ongoing consultation process we can be confident and clear about our community's expectations for student behaviour. We promote positive behaviours through rewards, incentives and encouragement (attendance reward, Virtues vouchers, reading nights books, Student of the Week, class rewards, 'kindness jar'...) and rectify inappropriate behaviours through counselling, parent/teacher communication and clearly defined consequences.

> Professional Support

It is a credit to many of our staff that they are on hand from 8:15am each morning to engage with students through homework and reading checks as well as physical activity. This is also a time to discuss issues affecting wellbeing so that students are ready for learning at 9am. Apart from our regular teachers and Teacher Aides, several support staff do their best in the limited time they are here to help students in need of social, emotional or academic assistance. These include Chappy Billi, Guidance Officer Wendy Fox, Special Education Teacher Brigid Darveniza, a twice per term visit from a Speech Language Therapist and twice per year visit from Life Education. Specialists in HPE, The Arts and Dance also visit once per week. We also engage regularly with eSafety and Kids Help Line.

strategies - ignore, talk friendly, talk firmly, walk away and report. Fighting back or being nasty doesn't resolve the situation, instead making matters worse and ensuring both parties end up in trouble.

There is a difference between conflict and bullying which is defined as continual harassment with intent to cause emotional or physical harm and often represented by a power imbalance. Despite our best intentions and efforts, sometimes we won't be able to prevent bullying which is considered a 'major' inappropriate behaviour according to our Student Code of Conduct and once identified, will not be tolerated at our school.

In any situation involving physical aggression or bullying, students are directed to report immediately to someone whether at school or home. If you suspect a case of bullying at school, please report this to the teacher or principal.

We are all responsible for the safety and wellbeing of our beautiful kids. When we model kindness to others, do our best in all aspects of our lives and reject physical aggression and abuse our children receive a consistent, positive message and gain confidence in their world. STUDENT FREE DAY - FRIDAY 5th September

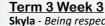
Students will not attend school on Friday 5th September. Staff will be at school engaging in professional development learning and planning. Teacher Aide's will also be updating their first aide & CPR.

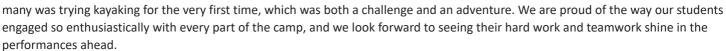
the heart if the school and his leadership and dedication to education enables each student to thrive for life and learning. Thank you!

Dear Parents,

The Year 1-2 children have been reading lots of persuasive texts and writing their own trying to convince tuckshop to buy an ice-cream machine, persuading parents to get a new pet and reasons why they should get pocket money. In Maths they have been solving real life problem, working with fractions, 2D and 3D shapes and they are starting to measure classroom objects accurately using informal objects like blocks and paperclips.

The Prep students are participating in the persuasive text unit but are writing about what they like about a book or character and why they like them. In Maths they are exploring shapes and working on number problems to 20.

In the coming weeks we will start assessment tasks and would appreciate your help in making sure that children are at school unless unwell. Parents can support their children by providing a nutritious breakfast and lunch each day along with a bottle of water. Ideas to add more vegetables

It can be tricky to think of new ways to add vegetables to the lunchbox. Here are some of our favourite tips:

CLASSROOM NEWS WITH MRS TAIFALOS



In **Science** students have been learning about the transfer of heat.

They have been investigating conduction which is when heat is transferred between objects which are in contact with each other. Students have also shared examples of how people slow heat moving from one object to another (e.g. keeping drinks cold by putting them in an insulated bottle or using thermos flasks to keep hot drinks hot for longer). They understand that this is called insulation. Discussions were undertaken to determine how this scientific knowledge of heat transfer has helped people in their daily lives e.g. insulating homes.

We have also been learning about how to use a thermometer to measure temperature.

In HASS, students have learning collecting information about the geographical aspects of their local community i.e. Location, built landmarks, natural landmarks, food production and tourist attractions and putting them into a PowerPoint.

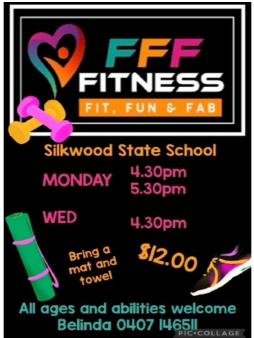

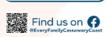
